Kia Ora whānau,

Ants, Jesus and Posie.

Apparently, if you put 100 black ants and 100 red ants in a jar, nothing will happen. But, if you shake the jar hard, the ants will start killing each other. The red ants will consider the black ants their enemies, and the black ants will consider the red ants their enemies. The real enemy is the one who shakes the jar.

Does a similar thing happen in human society?

Easter is coming. Jesus has 'turned his face towards Jerusalem,' has travelled through nearby Bethany and is now descending the Mount of Olives into Jerusalem and is heading for the cross. In Luke's gospel (Luke 19:37) we're

told "As they reached the descent from the Mount of Olives, the entire crowd of disciples joined them and began to rejoice and praise God loudly for the display of power they had seen, saying, "Blessed is the One who comes in the name of our God! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest!"

But not all were celebrating. There was this crowd, but also, another crowd – the Pharisees.

Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to Jesus, "Teacher, rebuke your disciples!"

Jesus replied, "I tell you, if they were to keep silent, the very stones would cry out!"

Jesus then weeps over the city saying "if only you had known the path to peace today!"

Jesus then begins teaching in the temple area every day. "Meanwhile, the chief priests and religious scholars were looking for a way to destroy him, as were the leaders of the people, but they had no idea how to achieve it – the entire population was listening and hanging onto his every word." (Luke 19:47+48)

Here are crowds of people (one protesting the old rules and celebrating Jesus, and another wanting to stick with the old rules) and an enemy looking to cause pain and division – the chief priests and religious scholars (those who think they know best, who have studied the scriptures, who like to make the rules and have people keep the rules).

This week has seen crowds gather at Albert Park in Auckland too. Some people who hold genuine fears about sharing bathroom spaces (being one key example) with trans women need to be well listened to. Another crowd of Rainbow community (and their allies) who have a history of and still experience harassment, abuse, bullying and discrimination. Enter Kelly-Jay Keen-Minshull, AKA Posie Parker. She shakes the jar of ants. She, like the chief priests and religious scholars in Jesus' day looks to cause pain and division.

I suspect the religious leaders in Jesus' day had 'read the room.' They had a history of success with removing (read: cancelling, destroying) God-led prophets. They got what they expected. I suspect Posie didn't read the room. Holding a minority view that speaks hurt against a variety of people groups (Rainbow Community, Immigrants, People of Colour), having had protests at many previous events, not paying attention to the disinvite of other far-right activists in Aotearoa, hosting an event in such a public place as Albert Park, speaking so arrogantly to our country's leaders – surely Posie hadn't read the room. This was always going to end messily. Jesus made a whip and used it to shut down hurtful, divisive, mis-led actions. I'm glad the counter protestors didn't go that far!

Regardless of where one sits politically, theologically, or ideologically, we should all be able to agree that people – regardless of how they identify – should be able to exist without fearing harassment, abuse, bullying and discrimination."
